Simmo's Tyre Tips

Does your car's steering wheel vibrate in your hands while driving at highway speeds? If so, you may have a wheel balance issue. Vehicles these days have reasonably light suspension components so when there is a balance issue it will manifest itself with the steering wheel shaking in your hand at highway speeds. We balance wheels with either stick on strips of weight for alloy rims or bang on weights if wheels are standard steel type. What is actually happening when your wheels are rotating is that the heavy spot on the tyre and rim combination is trying to lift the wheel through centrifugal force off the road when it reaches the top, then pushing down at the bottom of the wheel's rotation. The amount of force generated by only 35 grams of imbalance at 100kph is approximately 8 kilograms trying to lift the wheel up then down in rapid succession and this in turn transmits through the steering to you as a vibration or shake.

A problem than can seem like balance i.e., your steering wheel shakes at slow speeds and seems to get better the faster you go is more than likely a tyre that is coming apart (separating) and needs to be replaced. The steering wheel will wobble at slow speed and turn into a vibration at faster speeds.

If you're not sure if it's a balance issue or tyre issue, just bring your car in and we can take it for a quick test drive and inspect the tyres to figure out what the problem is.

Young driver safety



James and his teenage son, Bennett, recently did the Driver Directions programme for young drivers. It was a very worthwile programme and James thoroughly recommends it for your teenage driver.

Driver Directions is a practical, 1-day programme that gives young drivers an opportunity to upskill on important aspects of driving in a safe off-road environment under the watchful eye of their parent/caregiver. Young drivers are guided through a variety of skill based activities such as:

- Braking
- Parking, reversing and low speed manoeuvres
- Emergency reactions/awareness
- Stopping distances
- Crash avoidance / hazard detection
- Vehicle maintenance

The course is held in Mamaku from 9am-3.30pm on two dates each school holidays; lunch is provided and the course is FREE of charge. Participation requires a young person who holds a learners or restricted licence to attend in a car, accompanied by someone who has held a full licence for at least 2 years.

Ena's Scotch Rolls

Andrew's mother is Scots and always makes the best rolls. Excuse the Imperial measurements!

Ingredients

1 oz compressed yeast 1 tsp sugar

5 fluid oz vegetable oil (i.e.rice bran or canola oil)

1.5 pints milk & water

3 lb flour

1 tsp salt

Method

Mash yeast and sugar in a 2 litre jug until it liquefies. Add the oil and milk/water mix.

In a large bowl add the flour and salt. Make a well in the centre and pour in the yeast mixture.

Stir until it comes together in a stiff dough, cover with a damp teatowel and put somewhere warm to rise until double in bulk. (It will take about 2-3 hours).

Once it's risen, punch down and put onto a floured bench. Have 2 x floured trays ready. Cut dough into pieces (makes 16 rolls or 2 x loaves). If making rolls, shape as per the picture and place on trays. Leave to rise until half the size again. Glaze with egg wash, sprinkle with sesame or poppy seeds if liked. Cook in a very hot oven with rack slightly above half way. Rolls will take 15 minutes, loaves about 25 minutes.

When cooked, leave to cool on a wire rack so that they don't sweat and go soggy.
